








U.S. Dept. of Labor List of Goods Produced by Child Labor or Forced Labor

The List in Numbers


Number of Goods Produced Globally by Production Sector, Disaggregated by Child Labor and Forced Labor




Goods with the Most Child Labor Listings by Number of Countries














YESS Mission


To create an industry-wide due diligence program for yarn spinning mills and fabric mills to identify and address cotton produced with forced labor in their supply chains.






YESS Standard for Spinning Mills and Fabric Mills





YESS Achievements: 2021 – mid-2023

Accomplished 2021 - 2022

- Completed 8 pilot assessments in 3 countries; trained 20 auditors virtually, 7 inperson; issued <u>pilot report</u>
- Conducted <u>public consultation</u>, released *YESS Standard for Fabric Mills* & updated *YESS Standard for Spinning Mills v2.0* (<u>publicly available</u>)
- Updated training modules, quizzes,
 checklists, and resources (on YESS Portal)
- Assembled a 37-person Implementation
 Working Group (IWG) to provide input for an Action Plan

Accomplished 2022 - 2023

- IWG Action Plan issued
- Established a YESS Advisory Committee
- Participated in <u>GTP pilot</u> with ELEVATE in Pakistan – Assessed two mills – <u>Launched</u> YESS in Pakistan
- Participated in <u>STREAMS pilot</u> with Verité in India Assessed two mills <u>Launched YESS</u> in <u>India</u> Piloting traceability technology with YESS due diligence
- Created systems for mill engagement pre and post assessments

YESS 3-year Rollout Plan



YESS's Vision and Objectives

Vision:

Yarn spinning and fabric mills are empowered and supported in the development and implementation of due diligence systems.

Industry actors, diverse stakeholders, and local communities are collaborating to determine root causes, assess risk, eliminate forced labor, and remediate harm in the cotton industry globally.

The YESS due diligence approach is expanded to address other human rights, labor rights, and environmental risks in the production of cotton and other raw materials.

Objectives:

- 1) Develop and deliver a scalable system to build mills' understanding and capacity of due diligence activities and undergoing YESS assessments.
- Outsource and oversee the management of YESS assessments, including training, approval, and management of auditors.
- 3) Secure necessary funding, hire staff, establish a governing body, grow a membership community, and formalize partnerships with other initiatives.






Reason for Transition

Q.10 Which participation model do you prefer? (check one)




Q.11 Please check all factors that apply for the participation model you prefer

Sign up team for the YESS Portal to access resources and mills' assessment data


Review foundational training webinars, take quizzes, and become familiar with YESS Standards and resources
